Enata Enata is a Marquesan symbol that represents a human being. It can either be represented on its own, as a couple or a pattern. There are many different, slightly modified versions of enata you can commonly find in Polynesian tattoos. When two enata are mirroring each other, it usually represents a couple. You can also use the enata to symbolize your children, or even defeated enemies if used upside down. When many enata are represented in a row pattern it represents the sky, where the ancestors are believed to live. Other Elements You can use these ideas at the center of your tattoo and surround it with your favorite patterns. They can also be designed in a bigger size. Accurate depictions of animals weren’t typically used in traditional Polynesian tattooing, but they’ve become more prevalent in recent years. What you can do is use the outline of the animal and fill it with different patterns, as an updated version of a traditional style. Sun The sun is another important life-force and respected as a symbol of leadership for Polynesian cultures. It is often included in tattoos, in many styles, and includes different patterns. Tiki Tiki are stylized human characterizations, usually represented in wood or stone carvings. The name “tiki” in Maori culture refers to the first human on Earth, a god-like figure. You can include a tiki-style face carving in your tattoo, surrounded by traditional patterns. You can also use it on its own, even with colorful backgrounds. Stingrays Along with the shark, Polynesian tattoos often include stingrays. They are believed to bring their bearer peace, wisdom and protection, due to their ability to hide in the sand. You can brighten up the black color of the traditional style with hibiscus or another tropical flower of your choice. The tiki has the power to feel and chase evil. It symbolizes power and masculinity. It also functions as a lucky charm to protect its wearer against dangers and evil spirits. Shellfish and shells are a recurring feature of Polynesian tattoos, and in particular the turtle shell, a very important animal in Polynesian culture. The tortoise shell symbolizes longevity, well-being, fertility and peace. Shells and sea shells symbolize in a wider sense protection, a shield and intimacy. As mentioned above, the turtle is one of the most important animals of Polynesian culture, if not the most important. The tortoise symbolizes strength and protection. The turtle is also considered a divinity capable of moving freely between the earth and the ocean, considered as the beyond, and would therefore facilitate the passage of souls to their place of rest. The sun is often associated with other symbols to add a meaning of grandeur and prosperity. The sun also represents eternity, for it rises every day, and rebirth and renewal. In the Polynesian world, the ocean is considered the water from beyond, and the world where ancestors live. It can therefore mean death, or the afterlife. But the ocean being also their main source of food, it also represents life and fertility. In Polynesian tattooing, the ocean is often used as a complement to another tattoo. Spearheads symbolize combativeness and courage. If you consider yourself a warrior, include this symbol in your Polynesian tattoo is perfectly indicated. Shark teeth are one of the most common symbols in Polynesian tattoos. This design symbolizes shelter or cover, orientation, power, ferocity and adaptability. The Lizard is a form of divine appearance among the Polynesians. It therefore represents the gods and all that is divine. It is a symbol of luck and fortune for the one that sports it in his tattoos. Enata tattoo is a very common tattoo, especially in the Marquesas culture. The Enata represents men and gods. But it is when combined with other tattoos it has other different meanings. It thus illustrates the stages of a person’s life, such as births and marriages, as well as the social status of the person who carries it. An inverted Enata represents enemies. Although in many cultures the cross is associated with the Christian religion, this is not at all the case in the Polynesian religion, the Marquise Cross is a symbol of harmony and peace among all the elements. In Polynesian cultures, the sting ray is a sign of freedom. But it also represents the quiet force, an animal that hides its great power by humility and wisdom. It is a tree planted by people who claim to be strong, who think before acting and always seek to pursue justice in their action.The dolphinLike the stingray tattoo, the dolphin tattoo represents freedom in Polynesian mythology the dolphin guided the Maori to the promised land while protecting them from sharks. It was believed that earlier shells were used as money. Hence, shell tattoos were very popular as it meant that the wearer of this tattoo would have an abundance of wealth, fortune, and well-being. Tattoo and Culture Let’s take a closer look at the cultural significance of these tattoos, in the different islands of the Pacific Ocean Cook Island Tattoos The tattoos in the Cook Island included markings associating the wearer to his or her tribe. Tahitian Tattoos In Tahiti, tattoos were inked on the basis of social standing and ranking. Only tribe members belonging to the upper class were tattooed. These tattoos were inked all over the body, and sometimes on the face. Marquesan Tattoos The art of tattooing is a very important aspect in the culture of this island. Tattoos were worn to enhance physical appearance, signify the passage of life, and to show the ranking of a person in the tribe or society. Hawaiian Tattoos Hawaiian tattoos were etched for a person’s identification or simply as a fashionable work of art on the wearer’s body. The tattoos were believed to protect the wearer from mishaps. These tattoos were also inked to honor the dead, who were close to the wearer. Maori Tattoos The Maori tattoos of New Zealand, have distinctive spiral designs, which signify strength, courage, social status, and passion. The tattoos contain markings and reveal the ranking of a person, and also signify the wearer’s passage of life. Samoan Tattoos A Samoan tattoo, is like a documentation, telling the story of the person who sports the tattoo. It contains rank, age, and social standing. These tattoos are large and complicated. They are adorned by both men and women. Easter Island Tattoos Tattoos worn by the people of this island have religious significance. It is believed that these tattoos make the skin blessed, so that the wearer can communicate with God. Tonga Tattoos Tonga tattoos, are very similar to Samoan tattoos, telling the life story of the wearer and showing his ranking in society and his age. History The art of tattoos was considered a sacred art in Polynesian culture. A tattoo was inked in a ceremony with music (drum beats) and tribal dancing. A person who wanted the tattoo had to follow a series of rituals, both before and after inking of the tattoo. Earlier, tattoos were done using crude equipment like bird and animal bones, turtle shells, bamboos and the likes. These tattoos took a long time to heal, but yet people got them done. They symbolized courage, power, and ranking in society. The age of eligibility to get a tattoo, was 12 years, as this age is considered a transition from childhood to adulthood. Every achievement was felicitated with a tattoo. The more number of achievements, the more would be the tattoos. In Polynesian culture, having several tattoos on the body was a matter of prestige. These tattoos were not only made on men, but also on the womenfolk of the tribes. However, the parts of the body for tattooing women was limited to the arms, chin, lips, and palms. Polynesian tattoos are a beautiful piece of art. But, before you get a Polynesian tattoo done, please research as the tattoos have different meanings in different islands due to their diverse cultures.
